7. Find the sword of John Quincy Marr (left case on back wall). For what "first" is he remembered? When was he killed?

8. Go to the "Battleground of a Nation" panel. How many military events took place in Virginia? How many casualties occurred on Virginia soil?

9. Go to the center and find the case with the doll in it. List two ways that civilians suffered during the war.
